It is always a sorrow to say goodbye to valued Staff and pupils and a joy to welcome "new blood". This year we say good-bye to Miss Witherington, who leaves us with a memory of much hard

work performed and interest shown in girls' games and House activities generally. We wish her every success in her new post and hope that she has enjoyed her association with us. Many valued pupils also, who have contributed much to our sporting competitions, are leaving us. We wish them well in their careers and hope that their future lives will bear some traces of what we havetried to teach them.

After some delay, due to bad weather, we opened our sports programme with the Senior Soccer competition. We took a further step towards the prize by reaching the final, thanks mainly to a fine spirit and a great deal of endeavour. After victories over Marsh and Norley, in which we scored 14 goals and conceded only 1, we had a walk-over into the final when we met Ainsworth, the favourites. We played with such zeal in the first half that we led 1—0 and were clearly the better side. Ainsworth, however, were more experienced as a team and, after a well-fought secondhalf, ran out worthy winners by 4—1. The girls' netball team, the best we have seen for many years, gave us our first taste of real success by winning the Netball Cup. After sweeping aside Ainsworth and Norley Houses in preliminaty rounds, we met Byrom House in the Final. Speed on court and really brilliant shooting won this match for us by the very convincing margin of 13--3.

For us, the Swimming Competition was almost a repeat of last year's. We had only one competitor from the Senior girls, but we were again placed 3rd in the competition. It is quite obvious that we cannot hope to win this competition unless we have a full entry from all sections of the House.

The Spring Term saw three exciting competitions, Junior Soccer, Rugby and Hockey. The Soccer team again did not lose a match but failed to qualify for the Final on goal average despite winning their last match 6—2. The Hockey team did really well to reach the Final, which they lost to a superior Byrom side 5—0. The Rugby team has again had a wonderful season and again lost in the Final after a creditable performance. Surely it will be our turn to win next year!

The House Rounders competition again saw Assheton and Byrom locked together in an exciting match. Our road to the Final was our most glorious to date; each one won with an innings to spare. There was great hope that this may be our year, but, alas, it was not to be. Our girls played well but below their best and Byrom declared after passing our total.

Our last competition, Athletics, was the most unsatisfactory I have ever known; not because of the results, but because of the attitude to the competition and the atmosphere in which it was held. We have talent in abundance in the House and yet our entries were made up mainly by "unknown" athletes or those

whose past successes were only average. It was to their great credit that with a team of only 30 boys and girls out of a total of more than 200, they gained $122\frac{1}{2}$ points, which is nearly half as many as those gained by the winners of the competition. The pity was that they did not seem to merit even a cheer from our members of the Base Athletics Team who could only stand and watch.

If we can for a moment erase the memory of this stain on our House records; the rest of the picture is quite promising. In the 7 competitions in which we took part, we won 1, were finalists in 4, and gained 3rd position in another. If ever we can command a full measure of support from the House as a whole, and not just from a few enthusiasts, our results could be quite remarkable.

SWITZERLAND, 1968

Yellow lights sparkle in the early morning chill which penetrates the breath-streaked window. Press your face into the hard couchette pillow, face the upholstered bulkhead. Fight the sounds of the restless travellers who, with the approach of dawn hesitant as it might be in the misty lowlands of Basle, now feel no constraint to keep their uncomfortable vigil to themselves. Listen to the train, no longer pulled by the high-piffling French monster of the previous evening, as it gradually writhes towards the highlands, occasionally hooting gently to itself.

Continental breakfast at six in the morning. Coffee in comforting thick cups, air-fresh rolls and croissants with apricot jam. Berne Station Buffet; high-ceilinged, staid, well-staffed, clean, crisp, with a twenties atmosphere, as if you expected to look up and find Scott F. himself arguing with Hemingway at a nearby table. Outside, men sling themselves with long strides along the streets, skis on shoulders, high tans on cheekbones, and not a second glance for the impressed English.

Lausanne behind us and along the misty shores of Lake Leman when floating impossibly high over the water, come mountain peaks, the sunlight silvering the snow. All change at Aigle: Switch-back and twist-neck to Champéry. Look up; look down the travel-poster Switzerland is discovered at last. Champéry has the feel of a Klondike town of goldrush days and when you see all the signs of the exploitation of Le Ski you know why.

First day on skis. Up a further two thousand feet to Planachaux by the télécabines, the blue, yellow and red bubbles swinging evenly, eerily, up and down the mountainside. A hurried headlong lunge into the groaning, swaying, bouncing car and then up, caught on the air, soaring away from the valley, snagging on the pylons, to the snowline and beyond.

The ski-slopes. French families en masse. Three-year olds flash past on one leg and uncle sucks on his cigar. On the nursery slopes the beginners form staggering lines like extras in the shooting of a film epic. The ski-instructors, lords of the upper air, cut dashing figures in the snow. Red-anoraked, they slide through the motions, mirror lenses, golden tans, all present and correct, to survey the tumbling bodies before them, dream of winter Olympics, and draw on a casual cigarette. Light; sun; bombarded from every angle the face tingles and tightens and you know that later on it will burn. Back to the cable-cars. The jabbering horde is steadily dispatched, two at a time, to drop over the edge of the world, be committed to space and watch the pines slip slowly by and the higgledy chalets zoom back to realistic proportion.

Good Friday. No hot cross buns but several English skiers who are both hot and cross. The Dents du Midi, 3260 metres of them, out of sight in the swirling mist and sporadic snow. The sun tries to elbow through the cloud. A thousand feet below, the main valley and all its branches are piped full of evenly distributed cloud that lies motionless, gobbling up cable cars as they plummet blindly downwards. The télépherique cables curve down from the Planachaux and are cut off by the cloud. If you pull them hard you will fish up Champéry.

Outside the restaurant at Planachaux are skis: reds, blues, greens, yellows (what colour are mine?); straps dangling, bindings glittering, all dripping. Inside it's chips with everything and every nationality for itself in the scramble for tables. You can have a fried egg for four shillings or even two eggs in one omelette for four and six. Whatever you drink will cost you two shillings. And always there are your inseparable companions; the ski-sticks: jammed in radiators, projecting from under chairs, falling with a clatter and, often, being forgotten.

Evening along the street. Silhouettes of inward-leaning roofs threaten to meet overhead, but at every corner there is a glimpse of the moonlit heights around the valley. The moon balances precariously on a peak, but does not burst. In little concrete boxes by the sides of the steps are purple pansies, crystalline in the chilly air so that you want to snap one off and taste it.

Easter Day. The congregation in Sunday best, matronly black and anoraks issues onto the small square beneath the detached camponile. The town band leaps into a festive tune and the local people murmur approval and go rigid with pride as the tourists click and whirr their appreciation. The Swiss flag flutters in the air of good feeling and the skiers bound for the cable cars slalom on ski-less feet through the standing crowd.

Dusk falls, the valley darkens and the sunlight lingers on the mountain tops. Puffs of cloud flirt around the peaks and vanish as the snowy pinnacles of the Dents du Midi change from golden to pink and stab into the purpling sky. In the distance the Diablerets ghost through the twilight, untouched by the setting sun.

The creamy donging cows of postcard fame are still in winter quarters shut up in the chalet-farmhouses such as the one in the upper valley with three isolated pines in the sloping snowy meadow, each tree with a perfectly round pool of clear earth beneath it.

The day of departure. Six boys have passed the test of the Swiss Ski Club and no bones are broken, although some dignities are bruised. By ten o'clock the sun is fixed directly over the narrow valley, pinning down everything that dares to move too quickly. Heat trembles and bounces around the rocky gorge, the walls of which provide a natural cinema screen in summer. The morning staggers forward. Mrs. Hall sees Mont Blanc on her last expedition up aloft but down below the panting dogs, the meadow-roving tabbies and the sweltering souvenir hunters seek only the next drink. The sheriff sleeps in his office; no wet-backs creep from the distant Rio. The train is beached at the end of the street and the two-men crew drink in silence at the nearby bar. One reads the local paper, reaching out unerringly, without looking, for his glass. His friend gazes towards the snowy top of the valley.

Eventually, like an expanding rule twisting and coiling and occasionally jamming its way back into its shiny shell, the train descends to the plain. At lake level it rocks along from Monthey with its "Hotel des Tramways" and palm trees and cultured lawns to Aigle where the real trains begin. Over the youthful Rhone, brown with melting snow and prancing between concrete banks, and through fields of almond blossom, so that the level plain looks like the sea bed.

Along the shores of the great lake the train sways, head down and elbows in. The lake is still with solitary gulls perched on jutting rocks, room for one standing. Or sometimes we rush round a bend and catch birds taking their ease in the shallows and away they go in futile, hysterical haste, flapping hard and low to safety from safety. A stone chateau sticks out into the water, looking too young to be interesting and too desolate to be ignored.

Montreux and young, thrusting skyscrapers look bold, but sadly out of place. Small exclusive marinas harbour expensive boats, nonchalantly neglected, and we glimpse dark, watered tennis courts with clean fresh players miming happily. We see the Trans-Europe Express surge into Lausanne; streamlined, blue and cream, extravagantly equipped with wagons-lit. No bodies are carried from it; no victims of espionage or international financial stress; no fugitives cling to the roof. This descendant of the Orient Express seems too safe and unromantic. Safe and unromantic; the very words remind us that we will soon be home in Bolton.

The Association can once again be pleased with the success, financially, of the past year. However, many of the events arranged suffer greatly from the lack of support of the parents. When one considers that there are some 1600 pupils on the base the attendance at the events organised show that the majority of the parents have little or no interest in their child's School.

The Ladies' Committee during the past year organised a Hallowe'en Party for pupils of the Junior Schools. This proved such a tremendous success that another is being organised for October 29th and if this proves as popular as the last one, it is quite likely to become an annual event.

We are sorry to hear that Mrs. Thornton, the Ladies' Secretary, has resigned, but we feel sure that her successor, Mrs. Thompson, who is already a member of the Committee, will prove to be just as capable.

The Committee have this year committed themselves to doing something about the playing fields which are always in a terrible state after heavy rain, a frequent occurrence in Bolton. As usual, money is the first requisite and, in an endeavour to raise additional money to what we normally raise, it was decided to hold a Sponsored Walk. This took place on 27th July and we were fortunate in that the weather proved favourable for such an event. We are extremely grateful to all those pupils and staff who took part in the walk, to Mr. Clements who, almost single-handed, organised the event and did the paper work and to all others who rallied round to make it such a success.

Once again our thanks are due to the Headmasters and their staffs for all the time they spend on extra-curricula activities for the pupils and can also find time to assist the Parents' Association when called upon to do so.
