Due to Mr. Denton's absence this year, I was asked to take over the running of the House. Our continued progress bears witness to the splendid co-operation and help I received from all the House staff, whose early advice and guidance were greatly appreciated. Of course, one must not forget the children, who after all are the ones who "do" things for Ainsworth. The willingness to help at House functions, and to participate on the games field are essential, and were there in good measure. But one realises as the year goes on that the same names are coming forward on every occasion. The "washers up" at the Xmas parties compete on Sports Day and represent the House at the Swimming Gala. We have operated in all fields of House activity with about half our members. Are we to assume that there is a minority who are good at everything and the majority good at nothing?

However, these are carping criticisms, and by the way, for I am full of admiration for the young people who contributed this year. On the games side there has been a sustained keenness to do well. Our biggest success was to win the Senior Football trophy, probably the hardest fought of all the competitions. On our way to the final we beat Barton, Hulton, and Norley, finally emerging 2—1 winners against Radclyffe. All the team performed with a good mixture of skill and spirit, and displayed good fighting qualities, particularly against Barton and Radclyffe. Allsop and Sheperd were perhaps the two outstanding players in a good team. The junior footballers lacked experience and weight and never challenged the leaders of the section. After an encouraging draw against Radclyffe, subsequent matches against Barton and Norley were lost. Morris was our outstanding player.

The girls' games owed a tremendous amount to Jean Anderton, whose organising ability and enthusiasm proved invaluable. She deserved better than to see all our teams eliminated before the finals. The netballers never really got going and lost to Marsh in the first round. The hockey team promised well when beating Norley 4—1, but a 2—3 defeat by Byrom finished our hopes. The Rounders Competition produced two very exciting matches for us. In the first one we beat Radclyffe  $10-9\frac{1}{2}$  and the second one resulted in a  $6-6\frac{1}{2}$  reverse. The team displayed much promise and ought to improve next year.

In the Swimming Competition we finished in 7th position, but creditable performances were put up by M. Hutchinson, G. Johnston, Carol Jones, Ann Dearden, W. Ainsworth, H. Crook, G. Jones, D. Neville, A. Schofield, Lynn Martin and Deirdre Livesey.

In November the Christmas Fayre descended upon us and many members of the House brought gifts for the stall. To all who contributed in any way grateful thanks are due, especially to Fiona Horrocks, Iris Laidlaw and Yvonne Jones, who held the fort on the day. As a result of our efforts, £15 was raised for the Parents' Association.

For the Christmas festivities we were once again joined by Barton, Byrom and Norley. The parties were a great success in spite of a "square" Housemaster, due to the fact that we were organised by a particularly "round" Mr. Green who kept the proceedings going with a swing. I am happy to report that all the staff came through their annual battering with rolled "Reveilles", with no serious effects. A word of thanks to the girls who did an excellent job of waiting on table and washing up afterwards.

The weekly collection for the Grenfell Association was continued and £8 was raised during the year.

At the time of writing the Athletics Competition has not been decided. There has been a good response generally, but the Intermediate Girls' entry has been lamentably weak. Good performances have come from M. Baines in the girls' events, and R. Shirres, I. Morris, D. Ainsworth, and J. Barkess in the boys' events.

The first and second years once again departed on their House trips during the post Bolton holiday 3 weeks. The first year trod new territory around Skipton and Bolton Abbey in the wilds of Yorkshire, and thoroughly enjoyed themselves; the second year invaded the peace of Rufford Hall, and then moved on to more familiar ground at Southport. The guide at Skipton Castle took the unusual step of locking us all in the darkened dungeon, to the great delight of some and the growing consternation of many, when he clanked away up the stone steps, proclaiming that he was off on his six weeks' holiday. I don't think anyone really believed him.

Finally, a word of thanks to Mrs. Thomason, Mr. Shippobottom, and Mr. Moss for musical accompaniment in House assembly, to Mr. Moss and Miss Holt for taking charge of lunchtime swimming, and to Mr. Olney for his work for the House in the Modern School. Their interest and experience have been of great value.

Towards the end of the Term the Inter-House Swimming competition was held and the number of entries received was generally encouraging, although it is sad to report that once again the Senior teams were supported by only a few "old faithfuls". Fifteen boys and girls gained places in the Finals and were placed 3rd in the competition.

To wind up a busy Term we all enjoyed ourselves at the Christmas parties, where pupils and staff joined members of Marsh, Hulton, and Radclyffe House in providing games and entertainment. We are always pleased to receive offers of help on these occasions, and this year saw as many willing hands as ever come forward to do all the many jobs which parties entail. Our thanks are extended to all who contributed in any way.

The Spring Term, with its Netball, Junior Soccer and Rugby competitions, brought us more than our usual quota of excitement and thrills. The girls, narrowly beaten 5—4 in a hard-fought net-ball match against Byrom, came back to win the Losers' Final convincingly by 13—3. The Junior Soccer team, one of the most spirited and courageous we have had, failed on goal-average to qualify for the Final, after three thrilling games in which they excelled themselves. They did not lose a match and they conceded only two goals in the competition. Our congratulations go to Byrom House, who edged us out of the Final by gaining a superior

goal-average in their final match. Finally, spirit and tenacity were in full measure when our Rugby team won through to the Finals of the competition. Although obviously the underdogs, they played with such determination that no fewer than two replays were played before a much-fancied Marsh side finally beat them.

It is a pity that this report should end with a wretched Summer Term report - wretched because the weather denied us all but one competition, the Rounders. Nevertheless, it is fitting that the girls should wind up the year's activities with a display of grit and determination which took them to the Finals. After overcoming many obstacles in the preliminary rounds, it was disappointing for them to be without a star player in the last vital match, where they were convincingly beaten by Byrom.

Our successes during the year have been very real and very encouraging, despite the fact that they have brought us no actual cups. Such enthusiasm as we have seen cannot fail, sooner or later, to bring us some tangible rewards. The one blot on the horizon is the fact that these successes have been achieved, in the main, by Middle - and Junior - School members. After expressing our gratitude to our previously-mentioned "old faithfuls", we realise that support for, and even interest in House activities is almost non-existent in the 5th and 6th Forms. Pupils in these Forms are the ones who have received most from the Schools in the way of instruction, guidance, organised leisuretime, help with careers, companionship etc. To avail themselves of all these benefits and to give nothing in return cannot be a source of satisfaction to them. Looking back over the year I can recall several irritations and annoyances, but these quickly fade into insignificance when one considers what the house has achieved. On the sports field Byrom has, again, been the most successful of the houses. Seven house competitions were contested this year, for the weather caused the cancellation of the athletics finals and both cricket competitions. Byrom has won the Rounders, Netball and Junior Football competitions outright and shares the Hockey cup with Hulton.

The Christmas Fayre was well supported by several members of the house and we are indebted to them and to their parents. The boys did us proud for they

#### MARSH



#### CHESS SOCIETY REPORT

As this year's Senior team was much the same as last year's, we were hoping for a fair amount of success in the Schools League and we were not entirely disappointed in this hope. The Senior Team finished third in the league, behind the strong Bolton School and Chadderton teams, winning five matches and losing two. The senior team also did well in reaching the semi-final of the Lancashire Schools Knock-Out Competition, where they lost to Queen Elizabeth G.S., Blackburn, by a narrow margin in a match which could have gone either way. The Intermediate team enjoyed a fair measure of success in their league, winning seven matches, drawing one and losing only two. The Juniors, although not entered in the League, played six friendly matches, winning three, drawing one and losing two. P. Karmaz and P. Broughton. in particular, have played very well in the School teams, and several of the younger players from the Technical School have shown great promise.

The Base team composed of staff and pupils continued to operate in the local Bury League and enjoyed a respectable season: two wins, four draws and two losses in their eight matches resulted in the team taking third place in the League. In the Knock-Out competition the team lost 2—4 in the semi-final to a strong Bury side which included three County players. On top board Mr. Evans failed to repeat his high percentage success of the previous two seasons, but nevertheless emerged with a 50+% score against tough opponents.

Individual players from Smithills have participated in various chess events which have taken place this year, 1966-67. Our two leading players, M. Smith and P. Karmaz have continued to represent the Lancashire County Junior team with success. In the Easter Congresses at Manchester and Bury respectively, M. Smith and A. Gardiner distinguished themselves with first places in their particular sections. In the fortnight following Bolton Holidays, a strong team recruited from S.E. Lancashire journeyed to Poland where chess receives much offical encouragement and State support: although the team did not fare well, M. Smith returned undefeated with the best individual record of any team member. On going to press, M. Smith, P. Karmaz and A. Gardiner are on the threshold of proceeding to the British Chess Congress at Oxford; in spite of the certainty of strong opposition at this long-established annual event they could do very well.

It is with regret that we wish farewell to Mr. Bernard Ramsbottom who has done so much for chess on the Base over the last years: this last season he took the overall responsibility for this Base activity and fulfilled it with great credit. At his side M. Smith (Senior Captain and Club Secretary) and P. Karmaz (Intermediate Captain), did everything required of them in their administrative supplementary roles. In the Bury League, Mr. Pearson continued to captain and administer team arrangements to everyone's satisfaction. To members of staff who assisted with transportation, invigilation and catering we acknowledge our immense debt and hope they may be prepared to help again in the future.

#### MODEL AIRCRAFT SOCIETY

The main activity this year has been the building and flying of chuck gliders. These models, made mainly from sheet balsa, are cheap to build, easily repaired if damaged, and enable new members to have a model in the air within a relatively short space of time.

One disappointing aspect has been the irregular attendance of our older members during the Spring and Summer months, when a few hours' work would have meant many fine completed models.

#### BALLOONING

Ballooning is not so much a hobby as a disease which grips its victims like an obsession. Once in the grip of this obsession its victims are powerless to resist and are dragged willy-nilly into many hair-raising adventures. The ideal for the Smithills hot-air balloon was first conceived by Mr. John Turner, a master in the Technical School, aided by Mr. Bennetts, Mr. McAvoy and several pupils; including girls from the base. The problem was approached scientifically by a process of trial, and modification of ideas. One problem which needed a good deal of thought was the basket and its controls which were worked on during the holidays, and also the net covering the balloon: the crew had to travel to Fleetwood to learn how to tie the knots on the net. The balloon registration G-ATLV, itself is 75 feet high constructed out of panels of polythene connected by a special type of sellotape. The pilot, Mr. Turner, is permitted only to make tethered flights, but has twice escaped; landing once in Springfield reservoir and once on some power cables at an air show at Dunstable, leaving the area without electricity for half an hour, Despite these two mishaps, several tethered flights have been made, including one evening, when about 10 people had turns at going up in the balloon.

All things considered, ballooning is a fascinating hobby and a great challenge to all concerned.

#### "TRIAL BY JURY"

Is this a typical review of some square social entertainment performed by the school? NO.

Are school soirees just hackneyed happenings, which depend solely upon archaic reportees such as "Early One Morning" and "There was a Laddie and his Lass"? NO. Are operas just incomprehensible cacophonies in foreign jargon? Definitely not.

This time, those hum-drum, stale, standard features were replaced by a refreshing unique programme. Enterprisingly staff and pupils embarked down a completely new vista: the ambitious, highly-individualistic prelude "A sympathy with Sounds", which provided a motley of musical tempo that was particularly impressive. Instead of restricting the evening's entertainment to one particular age-group in the school populace it introduced some talented performers from the lower school. The choice of music, notably the uptempo folk-songs (highlighted by the superb jazz quality of their instrumental accompaniment), as well as the imaginative renditions by junior orchestra, indicated a pleasingly modern trend: the ideal curtain-warmer for a light-hearted operetta.

Like a foliated rosebud, the performance reached full maturity and blossomed forth confidently with the production of "Trial by Jury"; a one act opera by Gilbert and Sullivan. From the onset, the exact note of joviality was struck. Werner Collier with great flair depicted the role of the nonchalant defendant; Casanova willing to marry two women and must be congratulated for the clarity of his diction.

The demure plaintiff was competently played by Leonie Heap and in spite of her role as the ill-treated heroine, she still managed to emulate those qualities which enhanced the light-hearted vein of the opera.

Undoubtedly, Frank Chapman merits special praise for his laughter-making impersonation of the boisterous judge because it was so aptly suited to the opera's scathing satire of the law. Having the finesse of a professional performer, he revealed his remarkable capacity for moving so agilely about an extremely small and crowded stage.

Jim Bourne also deserves mention for the confident and resonant manner with which he depicted the counsel for the plaintiff.

Stage production was handled with mastery and skill; there were many instances in which minor members of the cast were per-

mitted to come to the forefront and consequently made invaluable contributions to the farcical situation. By having such a large supporting cast constantly on stage this naturally exerted considerable pressure upon them but fortunately, owing to whole-hearted enthusiasm, their presence never proved cumbersome. Drama was never sacrificed for the sake of music. Also, just the right balance between singers and orchestra was maintained throughout; the calibre of the music being always of the highest order.

An admirable mood in which to close another school year was on the jovial note of "Trial by Jury", resulting unavoidably in a resounding verdict of success.

Undeniably the evening's entertainment clearly epitomised the close affiliation staff and pupils now share; a relationship which must be maintained if school-life is be happy and rewarding for all concerned.
